A Hard Way to See the Sights

Row, Row, Row your boat... All 15 area beach patrols will be represented in this year's grueling event

I'm sure you can imagine an easier way to get around the Wildwoods than to hop into a small wooden boat, take up a pair of oars, and put your back and shoulders into a 19-plus mile struggle against wind and tide and crashing ocean waves.

But, when you're filled with a competive spirit and wish to test your mettle against those oft-times savage elements as well as the very best athletes among your peers, there are few events more dramatic and challenging than

the annual "Around the Island Row."
North Wildwood's Beach Patrol, hosts and sponsors for this competition, has had a particularly successful summer in the various regional lifeguard competitions in which it has participated. The "row" is unique...19 plus miles of rowing on a course that circles the is-

The concept was born in the fall of 1975. Then North Wildwood City Councilman, Bud Tarbotton, teamed up with the beach patrol's Harry Zander. They began training with the idea of doing something that had never been done before. After successfully performing the feat, Tarbotton proposed that the North Wildwood Beach Patrol sponsor a race.

With the help of Captain Tony Cavalier (now North Wildwood's Beach Director,) the first official race was held in August, 1976. The winners of that event were Zander and fellow North Wildwood guard, Jim Troy. Troy and Zander repeated the following year despite stiff competition from a formidable pair of Wildwood Crest rowers. Guards from Cape May and Wildwood joined their counterparts from North Wildwood and the Crest in that 1977 event.

In 1978, competitors from Avalon and Stone Harbor were invited. First place honors that year went to Max Bilkins and John Greenwood, the Wildvood Crest pair who had finished a close second the year before. Remember the name Bilkins. It figures frequently throughout the narrative history of the

In 1979, crews from Atlantic City, Sea Isle City, and Ocean City joined the fun with the Crest repeating, as Bilkins teamed with second year guard, Dave Koper to lead the field that included tough competition from Sea Isle's Myles and Gerry Lederer.

Avalon, today known for the strength of its rowing team, asserted itself in the 1980 row with Dave Kerr and Dan O'Malley defeating Ventnor's entry on a day that is recalled as being particularly humid.

O'Malley and Avalon repeated in 1981 with Dan joining Peter Soderman. But not without a bit of drama that involved the always tricky Hereford Inlet.

Those familiar with the inlet know it to feature a winding narrow channel that is forever changing. In addition, the inlet is lined with sand bars, snaking from the ocean front back as far as the Intercoastal Waterway.

The Brigantine team had a rude introduction to Hereford Inlet. Leading throughout the race, their boat became snagged on a sandbar. Precious seconds were lost - just enough time to allow Ayalon's pair to pull into the lead and win the race.

That's what makes this event unique. It isn't simply men competing with one another. It's an endurance test with some of nature's wiliest, most powerful forces often combining to defeat even the strongest efforts.

In 1982, the team of Rick Shoyer and Tom Morrison came close to setting a new record in winning the row. But as Shoyer expressed it, the record didn't matter.

"...completing the row was all that counts."

Ocean City repeated in the '83 and '84 events with different pairs winning each year. Ron Kirk and John Herron set a new record of 2 hours, 57.5 minutes. (The original record, set in the race's beginning, was 2 hours, 58 min-

In 1985, Wildwood Crest brought the laurels back to the southern end of the county. Former champion, Max Bilkins returned to the winner's circle with another new partner, Bic Murphy. This would be the first of many successful 'round the island trips for this pair.

Another former winner, Avalon's Dan O'Malley took the '86 row with partner Bill Sieck.

The next year's 12th annual row saw a new record being set as Ventnor City Beach

Patrol Alumni, Dennis Funk and George Miller completed the course in 2 hours, 56.6 minutes.

This record stands today.

Over the next four years, the champion-ship changed hands with pairs from Ocean City (Chuck Dunn was one-half of the winning combination in 1988 and 1990) swapping honors with rowers from Atlantic County.

In 1992, the Wildwood Crest team of Bilkins and Murphy recovered the prize for southern Cape May County. They repeated in

Bic Murphy recently finished a respectable fifth in the American Ironman competitions held at the USLA Nationals in Cape May, while partner Murphy finished third as part of Cape May County's entry in the team singles row event.

Murphy and Bilkins will be back for the '94 row. Will they 3-peat?
North Wildwood Beach Director, Tony Cavalier figures the exact length of the course to be around 19 miles.

"The row starts right here (15th Street beach)," according to Tony. "Rowers head north through Hereford Inlet, back under the Stone Harbor bridge to the Intercoastal Waterway. The race is started at 7:30 a.m. because that's the time incoming tide hits the inlet. That'll help the rowers.'

Upon entering the intercoastal, the rowers will get a good look at Grassy Sound as they pass. They'll also get a fish-eye glimpse of the new "super bridge" that will someday lead into North Wildwood as they row beneath.

The course continues along the intercoastal, through the West Wildwood railroad trestle, under Wildwood's George Redding Bridge, and on beyond Sunset Lake and Wildwood Crest, Rowers will start back to the ocean as they pass the seafood processing plants, go under the Ocean Drive bridge between Two Mile Island and Cape May as they head into Cold Spring Inlet.
"They should be hitting the inlet just in

time to catch the outgoing tides," according to

Tony.

Rowers will then row north toward the starting point. They'll pass the Coast Guard Electronic Center, Diamond Beach, and the entire towns of Wildwood Crest and Wildwood. Rowers will be in view of the beach throughout their row.

Tony Cavalier indicates that all 15 area beach patrols have been invited to participate. And, with each unit sending two or three boats, there could be anywhere from 30 45 pairs competing.

Each unit will make their selections on who will represent the squad. Current beach patrol members and alumni have been invited to participate. Frequently members of squads will join together for the purpose of competing in the row.

For instance, North Wildwood will field at least three teams for this year's event. One of those teams will consist of squad alumnus, Greg Brady, currently a member of the New Jersey State Police. He'll be rowing with another alumnus Chris Oves, who actually worked for the Ocean City Beach Patrol. Chris, by the way, has finished second and third in previous rows.

"This event's not so much one squad against another as much as it is a competition to complete the row," Tony observes. Without a doubt, this is one of the most grueling of the

summer's many lifeguard competitions.

Another team from North Wildwood will feature current beach patrol member, Bill

Quinn, rowing with Wildwood Crest's Linda Kelly, a 12-year veteran of that beach. She has completed the row several times in the past and has ended up in the top half of those crossing the fin-

North Wildwood will also feature a new crew consisting of Romolo Forcino and Marty Hagen. Forcino has enjoyed success this summer in doubles rowing competitions — most recently winning in the Tri-Resorts Championships.

Rowers in this competition tend to be veteran lifeguards who are used to the wear and tear that an exertion such as a 19-mile row requires. Many of the entrants are lieutenants on their respective

beach patrols.

"This is a tough race requiring a lot of training and self discipline," Tony Cavalier observed, adding, "At this point, we don't have an actual list of who'll be here.'

By the way, the boats used in the row are 17 feet long, Van Duyne fiber-glass boats — not the wooden boats of

days and rows past.

Stamina and intestinal fortitude. along with a bit of luck are the key ingredients to winning the row. Past events have been won and lost with the timing of the break of a wave. And the bottom line is that it doesn't matter how big or strong or skillful a rower might be, the elements will play a role in determining

the winner. But, in reality, all who join in this event are winners with winning defined as undertaking and completing the quest. Those looks of satisfaction on the faces of those who complete the course — whether they finish first or last, is sufficient proof of this.

The annual Around the Island Row will start at North Wildwood's 15th Street beach on Monday, August 22 at 7:30 a.m.

N. WILDWOOD ROW TO START 34 BOATS

*The 19th annual Around The Island Row begins 7:30 a.m. today.

You'll have to get up pretty early Monday morning in order to catch the start of the 19th annual North Wildwood Beach Patrol Around The Island Row. In order to catch a favorable tide, the 34 two-man boats will get a floating start 7:30 a.m. Monday at 15th Avenue beach in North Wildwood.

recent summers. Last year, the 21-mile row around Wildwood took place only a day and a half after the Jerseys, putting the top South Jersey sprint crews at Also, the Around The Island Row is being held more than a week after the South Jersey Lifeguard Championships, something that hasn't happened in a disadvantage.

"It's the longest span of time ever between the South Jerseys and the island row and so we'll see more rowers of the South Jersey-type in this race," race director Lou Cirelli said. "These guys that do this are tremendous athletes. We're very pleased to have representatives from all 15 South Jerseys patrols, and that makes it a truly regional race."

The race strategy changes in the southward journey in the backbay as the crews go past the West Wildwood train trestle and under the Rio Grande Bridge. From 15th Avenue, the boats will proceed north in the ocean to the Hereford Inlet, go under the Stone Harbor Bridge and then the Grassy Sound Bridge.

Then it's on to the Cape May Bridge and the Cold Spring Inlet at the bottom of Wildwood island. Finally, the crews make the turn back into the ocean and sprint northward back to the finish line at 15th Avenue. Wildwood Crest Beach Patrol veterans Max Bilkins and Bick Murphy have won the Around The Island Row the last two years, and three times in all. Bilkins, 42, is the event's only five-time winner. Two 40-something Ventnor alumni crews are always in the hunt. Dennis Funk and George Miller, South Jersey doubles champions in 1973-75, were fifth last year. Jim Mason and Scott Jones were fourth in 1992 and third last year. Funk and Miller set the race's meet record in 1987, winning in two hours, 56.06 seconds.

"Guys who have rowed this race before have realized the importance of navigation, going in and out of the inlets and avoiding problems," Cirelli said. "They know the angles and the directions to take, like when going under bridges. They may have an advantage on the newcomers, but training and endurance is still what does it." 1/2/14 4:35 PM 1 of 3 Craig Whitehead and Mike Cras of Avalon, South Jersey doubles row champions in 1991-1993, should be right there too. Whitehead and Cras won the Upper Township Six-Mile Bay Race on Thursday. Ocean City's Bob Garbutt Jr., second last year with Scott Heery, will team Monday with brother Jeff Garbutt. Carl Smallwood Jr. and Greg Smallwood of Margate won the Dutch Hoffmans this year, and should contend.

City could surprise. Cape May's Steve Mogck and Jim Wadlow took third at Upper Township. Brigantine's Rob Canavan, fourth in last year's island row with Wildwood's Steve McGuinn and Dan McGuinn were seventh last year and second at Upper Township Thursday. John Ammerman and B.J. Fox of Atlantic Bill Baldwin, will team Monday with Jim Sigmund.

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CAPE MAY COMBO WINS ISLAND ROW

*Steve Mogck and Jim Wadlow pull away to a smashing victory and become the first Cape May team to win the annual event. Cape May Beach Patrol oarsmen Steve Mogck and Jim Wadlow made a big move in the Wildwood backbay and pulled away to a smashing victory in Monday's North Wildwood Beach Patrol Around The Island Row.

Mogck and Wadlow are the first crew from Cape May to win the 19th annual race and their clocking of two hours, 59 minutes, 50 seconds was the row's first sub-three-hour time since 1988.

The Cape May pair finished 20 lengths ahead of second-place Wildwood's Dan McGuinn and Steve McGuinn, who crossed the line in 3:01.06. The Ventnor boatlengths behind Wildwood. Ventnor alumni veterans Jim Mason and Scott Jones were fourth after a gap of eight more boatlengths.

With about one-fourth of the counter-clockwise 21-mile circuit around Wildwood complete, Mogek and Wadlow quickly went from fifth place to first, and from there they widened the lead.

"We made our move after the Grassy Sound Bridge (entering the backbay)," Wadlow said. "We wanted to get a comfortable lead and then maintain. We felt like this was more of a power row than a finesse row, due to the chop in the winds. Being a first-time crew, every time out we just get stronger nad stronger. We're peaking at the end of the season, better late than never."

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Mogck and Wadlow teamed up earlier this summer. The 22-year old Mogck, the son of Cape May Beach Patrol Captain Buzz Mogck, finished eighth around the island last summer with Marty Franco. Wadlow, 28, was 11th in the Wildwood row last year with Rich Demers.

"This is the fourth time I've rowed this race, and I was pretty much thinking that I didn't want to end up dying (at the end) like last year," Mogck, the bowman, said.

"I just wanted to hold on, stay clean and get my oars in the same as Jim. We avoided all the swells at the Hereford Inlet (the first turn, at the top of Wildwood). I saw a lot of crews get swamped there last year and I didn't think it was important to make a move there."

That's where two-time defending champions Max Bilkins and Murphy were hit broadside by a fierce wave entering the inlet and lost all four oars.

"I jumped out of the boat to get the oars," Murphy said. "A jetski gave Max two oars and he rowed toward me as I got the other two. We were about fourth or fifth (before the accident) and once we got our oars and bailed, we were next-to-last. I said to Max, "Let's go get breakfast," but he said we could get a workout out of it. We got our oars in the right place and did what we could."

At the awards assembly luncheon following the race, everyone was buzzing about the recovery that Bilkins and Murphy made. The Crest boat caught most of the field and finished in fifth place in 3:02.17.

At 8:05 a.m., two-man boats got a floating start in the ocean at 15th Avenue beach and headed north. At the Hereford Inlet, Funk and Miller led, with Avalon's Craig Whitehead and Mike Cras in second four lengths back. Bruce Hunt and Matt Guerrieri of Ventnor briefly led at the Stone Harbor Bridge. By the time the race got to the West Wildwood train trestle, Mogck and Wadlow were up by six lengths over Avalon, and the McGuinn brothers had closed to third.

Mogck and Wadlow kept pouring it on. At the Rio Grande Bridge, the Cape May team was up by seven lengths, and their lead was 12 lengths on Wildwood at the Cape May Bridge. After the Cold Spring Inlet at the bottom of Wildwood Crest, Mogck and Wadlow led by 15 lengths.

"Things went really well in our row," bowman Dan McGuinn said. "There was a nice race at the finish between us and Ventnor. We lost sight of Cape May as soon as they got in the ocean."

Funk, 43, and Miller, 44, rowed a steady race. Ditto for the 45-year-old Mason, and Jones, 39, "We just tried to stay competitive the whole race," Miller said.




