

Longport takes 4 of 5 races to win Dutch Hoffman Memorial Lifeguard Championships

WILDWOOD — The Longport Beach Patrol won four of five races to capture the team title at the 51st Dutch Hoffman Memorial Lifeguard Championships at the Lincoln Avenue beach Friday.



The event featured all 15 beach patrols in the South Jersey Lifeguard Chiefs Association. Longport finished with 20 team points. Avalon was second with 11. Atlantic City and Wildwood Crest each finished with eight.

Atlantic City won the tiebreaker for third place due to a higher finish in the doubles row.

But one of the most anticipated matchups this summer finally came in the swim, the third race of the event, as Longport's Joey Tepper and Avalon rookie Dolan Grisbaum went head-to-head.

Both are well-accomplished swimmers.

And they're great friends.

Tepper won by just a few steps on the beach in 14 minutes, 29 seconds. Grisbaum finished second in 14:36. Zach Vasser of Margate City was third (14:44).

"I'm definitely very happy with (the result)," said Tepper, an Egg Harbor Township graduate and a rising sophomore at the University of Tennessee. "I definitely knew he was going to challenge me a lot. I was nervous about it. I'm just glad I was able to hammer it home."

Tepper won the paddleboard right before the swim, finishing in 7:20. Brigantine's Lucas Hatch was second (7:46).

"It definitely tired me out," he said of the paddleboard race.

"Usually in the swim, I dial my effort to 11 from start to finish. I knew it was going to be a race coming in because the offshore winds make it so much harder coming in. Instead of pounding it

out from start to finish, I really tried to be super efficient in the first half. I knew I wasn't going to have the energy to go all out from start to finish.

Tepper wanted to "hammer it out" on the way in. When the swimmers turned the corner in the ocean, he just barely had the lead over Grisbaum.

"We have known each other for maybe over a decade at this point," Tepper said of Grisbaum. "It's a lot different being a rower than being a swimmer. Rowers, they know each other from other beach patrols.

"Swimmers, we know each other from club swimming. It's just always fun to see people you've known for awhile. It makes the race more exciting."

Tepper was The Press 2020 Press Boys Swimmer of the Year. Grisbaum earned the honor this year and is committed to swim at NCAA Division I Boston University.

Before the event started, they were seen talking by the ocean.

"It was different in terms of having someone to be next to the entire time," said Grisbaum, who had easily won the swim at the David J. Kerr Jr. Memorial Lifeguard Races, the Cape May County Championships and the Beschen-Callahan Memorial Lifeguard Races this summer.

"I've been swimming these by myself. Having someone next to me the entire time was nerve-racking. It (stinks to lose) for the first time this season. But losing is a part of the sport. Obviously, Joey was the better swimmer (Friday). I just have to swim my best next time."

Grisbaum said it was the best he could have swam, that he was pleased with his performance and happy for his friend.

"I just wanted it to be one and two with him," Grisbaum added.

The event, named in memory of former Wildwood Beach Patrol Captain Frank "Dutch" Hoffman, is the first leg of what is considered the South Jersey Lifeguard Chiefs Association's "Big Three." The other two are the 75th Margate Beach Patrol World War II Memorial Lifeguard Races on Aug. 6 and the 81st South Jersey Lifeguard Championships on Aug. 13 in Longport.

Mike McGrath and Sean Duffey of Longport won the doubles row for the second time in the last three years the event was held. But it was an intense battle with Erich Wolf and Jack Glomb of Avalon.

McGrath and Duffey had the lead as the boats were about 200 yards from shore, but Wolf and Glomb caught a wave to put them ahead.

But the two Longport rowers were able to pull ahead near the finish line and cruise to their second victory. They also won the event in 2018.

“I’m tired,” McGrath said with a laugh. “They (Avalon) caught a wave behind us. It was really close. Then we fell off ours. I thought they were going to get us there. It was too close.”

There was a west wind that made it tough to row, but coming to any of the “Big Three” events, “you have to give everything,” McGrath added.

There was a lot of celebration as they came ashore.

“It feels good,” he added.

McGrath also won singles row in 6:24. Wildwood Crest’s Colin Hess won the 2-mile beach run in 9:45.

“It’s a great team win,” McGrath said. “I mean Joey coming out and winning his two events, that was huge.”

Avalon Beach Patrol wins revamped Dutch Hoffman races

Sea Isle City second in eight-event format; Margate third, OCBP fourth

WILDWOOD – Sea Isle City’s Danny Rogers and Pat Scannapieco got things started by winning the opening doubles row at the 52nd annual Dutch Hoffman Memorial Lifeguard Championships Monday evening. Cape May’s Kennedy Campbell followed that with a win in the women’s rescue board race, but the night would belong to the Avalon Beach Patrol.

Avalon won three of the remaining six races and placed in two others to take the crown and dethrone the Longport Beach Patrol, the defending champions.

It was a beautiful night at the Lincoln Avenue beach in Wildwood for a revamped Dutch Hoffman championship, delayed from Friday night because of expected inclement weather. The host Wildwood Beach Patrol decided to change up the format by including three women’s events to go with three men’s events and the open doubles and singles rows.

That offered the opportunity for the 15 patrols in the South Jersey Lifeguard Chiefs Association to showcase a wider range of athletes compared to the upcoming final two big lifeguard races – Friday evening’s Margate WWII Memorials and the South Jersey Championships, both which feature only doubles and singles rows and a swim.

Despite having eight events, the host patrol ran things extremely fast with multiple events overlapping – the men’s swim started after the women’s rescue board athletes finished the first leg and it was the same way for the women’s swim following the men’s rescue board race. In the two runs, the men started only about 10 seconds ahead of the women.

The Avalon Beach Patrol started dominating in the third event of the evening, the 600-yard men’s swim. Ocean City High School graduate Dolan Grisbaum won the race and then teammate Brandon Hontz took the one-mile run. Grace Wiley placed third in the women’s run, which kicked off 10 seconds after the men. Her points added to a fifth-place finish by Alyssa Sittineri in the women’s 600-yard paddle.

Becca Cubbler earned the team’s third first-place finish, keeping Avalon ahead of the other teams, and then Erich Wolf cinched the victory with his second-place finish in the singles row.

Avalon finished with 23 points for the team title and the Sea Isle City Beach Patrol was second with 15 points. The Margate City Beach Patrol was third with 14 points, the Ocean City Beach Patrol fourth with 13 and the Wildwood Beach Patrol and Cape May Beach Patrol each had 11 points, but Wildwood finished in fifth with a tiebreaker. The other teams with points included the Longport Beach Patrol, 9; Ventnor City Beach Patrol and Brigantine City Beach Patrol with 7 each; Wildwood Crest Beach Patrol with 6 and the Atlantic City Beach Patrol with 4.

The other beach patrols competing included Upper Township, Stone Harbor, North Wildwood and Cape May Point.

Open Doubles Row

Longport's Sean Duffey and Michael McGrath were second in the doubles row, followed by Margate City's Hayden Smallwood and Bob Bechtel, third; Wildwood Crest's Terry McGovern and Jake Klecko, fourth; and Cape May's Andrew Treffeisen and Mike Fitzpatrick, fifth.

Women's Rescue Board

After Cape May's Campbell, Wildwood's Bella Taylor was second in the women's 600-yard rescue board race, Ocean City's Mia Gallagher was third; Brigantine's Grace Emig was fourth and Avalon's Sittineri fifth.

Men's 600-yard swim

Following Grisbaum in the men's swim, Ocean City's Dylan DeWitt was second; Margate City's Zach Vasser third; Wildwood's Brendan Lewis fourth; and Brigantine's James Haney fifth.

Men's one-mile run

Coming in after Avalon's Hontz in the one-mile run were Wildwood Crest's Colin Hess in second; Ventnor City's Michael Keough in third; Margate City's Linden Wineland, a standout runner and recent graduate from Mainland Regional High School, in fourth; and Atlantic City's Kevin Wallace in fifth.

Women's one-mile run

Wildwood's Tess McVan, who less than a week earlier won the title at the Cape May Point Women's Lifeguard Challenge, easily outdistanced the other lifeguards to win the women's one-mile run. Sea Isle City's Bridget Kennedy was second; Wiley from Avalon third; Ocean City's Claudia Booth, another Mainland graduate, was fourth; and Brigantine's Megan Winterbottom fifth.

Men's Rescue Board

Cape May Beach Patrol guard Clay Stephens won the men's 600-yard rescue board race, leading the pack on the way in after the final turn, and then outracing a pair of competitors in a mad dash to the finish on the Lincoln Avenue beach. Stephens was able to outsprint Ventnor City's Ben Iannelli, who came in second; and Brigantine's Sean O'Neill, who was third. Ocean City's Andrew Shaw was fourth and Sea Isle's Corbin King was fifth.

Women's 600-yard swim

Cubbler was well ahead of the pack to win the women's 600-yard swim. Atlantic City's Megan Fox, a recent graduate of Atlantic City High School, was second; Sea Isle City's Mary Kate

Leonard was third; Ocean City's Ava Berzanski was fourth; and Margate City's Olivia Scherbin, a former standout swimmer for Ocean City High School, was fifth.

Open Singles Row

Margate City's Bob Bechtel won the open singles row, with Avalon's Wolf in second; Atlantic City's David Kenny in third; Sea Isle City's Danny Rogers in fourth and Longport's Michael McGrath in fifth.

(Both the singles and doubles rows were open, meaning female lifeguards were eligible to enter, but all of the entries in both events were male lifeguards.)

Avalon wins 2nd straight Dutch Hoffman Memorial title

WILDWOOD — The Avalon Beach Patrol displayed its depth Friday.

Dolan Grisbaum, Brandon Hontz and Maggie Murphy each won a race to lead Avalon to its second straight Dutch Hoffman Memorial Lifeguard Races title at the 53rd edition of the annual event.



The Hoffman Memorials, the first leg of the “Big Three” races in the South Jersey Lifeguard Chiefs Association season, featured all 15 South Jersey patrols.

Grisbaum won the men’s swim, Hontz the men’s 1-mile beach run and Murphy the women’s 1-mile beach run. The victories were back-to-back-to-back.

Avalon also finished third and fourth in two other events en route to 20 overall team points. Brigantine and Wildwood Crest each had 15 points, but Brigantine finished second on a tiebreaker in the doubles row.

Scoring was 5-4-3-2-1 for the first five places.

“It feels good,” Avalon Beach Patrol Chief Matt Wolf said. “Anytime you win is a great feeling.”

The other legs in the “Big Three” are the Margate Beach Patrol World War II Memorial Lifeguard Races next Friday and the South Jersey Lifeguard Championships on Aug. 11. Both races, which will be held in Margate, consist of just a doubles and singles row and swim.

On Friday, Avalon did not score in any of the rows.

“Honestly, the bigger goal is in front of us,” Wolf said. “It’s the South Jersey (championships), and we did not do as well as we wanted to in those two events (Friday). So when you win and you don’t feel great, it’s still a great night because we know we can still be better. It’s two weeks, and that’s where our focus is. But we will enjoy this until (Saturday) morning and then get back to work.”

Avalon won the David J. Kerr Jr. Memorial races and the Cape May County Championships. Avalon was second at the Beschen-Callahan Memorial races. All those events have multiple races that test the patrols' depth.

"Our beach patrol is very deep," Wolf said. "We have deep talent, and it helps us. We enjoy those bigger races."

Grisbaum won a close swim against Margate's Zach Vasser, a recent Mainland Regional High School graduate, and Charles Schreiner, a rising senior at Egg Harbor Township. Grisbaum is an Ocean City High School graduate who was the 2021 Press Boys Swimmer of the Year.

"I'm really shocked I won that race," said Grisbaum, who said he was fifth at the first buoy. "They are all so fast. Charles and Zach, and all of them, are such great competitors. I thought I was going to get third. I was picking up no ground."

But Grisbaum caught a really big wave coming to shore.

"That was lucky," said Grisbaum, a rising junior swimmer at Boston University who won the swim at the South Jersey race in 2022. "I'm not where I was last year, and it's definitely showing in my races. Like, that race was really close. I took a back course, and I think it paid off."

Hontz and Murphy swept the runs, which was crucial for Avalon. Hontz, who ran track at Penn State and will graduate with a master's degree in a couple weeks, won the Hoffman event in 2022.

"It feels great. I knew I was the defending champ coming in, and I knew our team needed some points after the doubles," said Hontz, who hasn't lost a run this summer. "I wanted to get as many points for my team as I could. Luckily, the tide was going out, so there was a good amount of hard sand to run in. The soft sand is pretty brutal."

Murphy, 18, a second-year lifeguard, is a recent graduate of Mount St. Joseph Academy in Flourtown, Pennsylvania, and plans to run for the University of Pennsylvania in the fall. She took the lead with about 600 meters left. Wildwood Crest's Maddie Priest placed second, and Sea Isle's Emily Kulak third. "I tried to go out and pick runners off one-by-one," she said.

Brigantine's Grace Emig won the women's paddleboard. The 24-year-old was in the lead the entire time, but it was a very close finish that came down to a foot race with Wildwood Crest's Adrienne Bilello. Emig called herself "more of a distance paddler," so the sprint was tough on her, she said.

“This is always a weird race,” Emig said. “The sandbar goes out really far. So, it’s nice when I am coming in. I can just stand up and run, especially if I am at that disadvantage and I don’t get that wave. This race is really fun to do. It helps me with my training. It’s fun to do.

“We have a really strong team and depth in our beach patrol.”

Brigantine’s Sean O’Neill won the men’s paddleboard. Brigantine uses the paddleboard for rescues as well as racing and will host a South Jersey paddleboard championship in August. Ocean City’s Andrew Shaw was second.

“The paddleboard is a big thing in Brigantine for sure,” O’Neill, 31, said. “We train on the boards all the time, and we try to get 1% better every day.”

Atlantic City brothers Sean and Rick Blair won the doubles row in 12 minutes, 44 seconds. The former Absegami rowers finished about a boat-length ahead of Brigantine brothers Jack and Joe Savell (12:48).

Sean Blair also won the singles in 7:33. Longport’s Mike McGrath was second (7:41).

“The last half was really close,” he said. “I swung the flag probably in fifth position. Everyone was really clumped up in the north end, and I tried to stay away from them to avoid oars clashing. I was able to get a wave on the way in.”

Longport’s Jordyn Ricciotti won the women’s swim. Sea Isle’s Mary Kate Leonard was second.

“She was ahead of me right in the beginning, so I just tried to chase her down,” said Ricciotti, a rising senior at Mainland. “It got really tough at the end, and I did my best to pull through. It’s definitely good to come out. Me and (patrolmate) Megan (Fox) have gone 1-2 in most of our races this year, so she trusted me to get first in this. I’m thankful for her.”

Avalon lifeguards win Dutch Hoffman races for 3rd straight summer

WILDWOOD — The Avalon Beach Patrol won the Dutch Hoffman Memorial Lifeguard Championships the last two summers.

Before the award ceremony Friday, the patrol returned the trophy to the Wildwood Beach Patrol, which hosts the event, to hand it over to the next champion.

But Avalon was not away from it for too long.

Avalon only won one event but finished second in three races and placed third in two others en route to its third consecutive Hoffman championship at the Lincoln Avenue beach. It was the 54th edition of the event.

Avalon won the eight-race event with 24 team points. Brigantine and Margate each finished with 16, but Brigantine won the tiebreaker with a better finish in the doubles row.

Scoring was 5-4-3-2-1 for the first five places.

“It’s always great to win,” Avalon Beach Patrol Chief Matt Wolf said. “We have a deep patrol and these kinds of races, I think, really show how deep we are all the way around. But I feel a lot better about it this year.”

That’s because Avalon’s Ryan Finnegan won the singles row, Alex Zoldan placed second in the men’s swim and Dave Giulian and Gary Nagle placed third in the doubles row. The two rows and the men’s swim are the South Jersey Championship races.

The Hoffman Memorials, the first leg of the “Big Three” races in the South Jersey Lifeguard Chiefs Association season, was the first event this summer that featured all 15 South Jersey patrols. The other two majors are the Margate Beach Patrol World War II Memorial Lifeguard Races next Friday and the South Jersey Lifeguard Championships on Aug. 9 in Brigantine.

“That fills me with confidence for the next two weeks,” Wolf said. “These girls and guys have worked really, really hard. It’s just nice to see that hard work rewarded.”

Finnegan won the singles row in a close battle with Brigantine’s Jack Savell. Finnegan won in 9 minutes, 2 seconds, only three seconds ahead of Savell.

“That was good,” Finnegan said. “We had that little swell at the end that pushed me ahead a couple inches. It was flat. There really wasn’t any wind. It was just a straight row.”

Last summer, Finnegan finished sixth in the race.

“It was good to see where I match up against everyone else, too,” Finnegan said. “Only two weeks to go until South Jerseys.”

Savell also won the doubles row with his brother, Joe, in 12:19. Margate’s Bob Bechtel and Chris Spiers finished second (12:24). The Savell brothers had never won the doubles row at the Hoffman Memorials.

It was a pretty flat course, which we like, honestly. We don’t really like it that rough,” said Joe, who noted he lost his oar early in the race “which threw us off a bit, but we were able to get back in the rhythm. It means a lot to us, definitely.”

Brigantine’s Grace Emig won the women’s rescue board race for the second straight summer.

“It’s great,” Emig said. “We have a really strong team this year. This race is always fun to be at. It’s really fun. I noticed it with all the girls here. We have so much camaraderie and cheering each other on.”

Margate’s Zach Vassar won the men’s swim. Teammate Sofia Day won the women’s 1-mile beach run. Vassar is a 2023 Mainland Regional High School graduate. Day is a rising senior at Mainland.

Cape May’s Zeb Hinker, a 2022 Lower Cape May Regional graduate, won the men’s 1-mile beach run. Longport’s Megan Fox, a 2022 Atlantic City graduate, won the women’s swim.

“This was my first 1-mile lifeguard race,” said Day, who this week was named [The Press 2023-24 Female Athlete of the Year](#) in high school sports. “It’s just been really fun to be a part of the team. It’s totally different than anything I have done. It has been really enjoyable to do it with Margate. It’s a cool experience to do it on the beach.”

Day is accustomed to running on cross country surfaces and said doing so on sand is difficult.

“My calves are definitely sore the next day,” she said. “But I still enjoy it.”

Last summer, Vasser finished second in the swim behind Avalon’s Dolan Grisbaum, an Ocean City graduate. But Grisbaum is not competing this summer.

“This is one of the only races I haven’t won yet, so it’s good to win it,” Vasser said. “Of course, great competition, as always. Condition-wise, it was fun. It was a great time. Shorter than usual. Usually I am a distance swimmer, but I enjoyed this one.

Hinker placed second in the men’s run last summer behind Avalon’s Brandon Hontz. On Friday, the finishes were reversed. Hinkler has been training for triathlons recently, so “biking has been my main focus,” he said.

So he wasn’t sure how he would do Friday.

“It was really cool,” Hinker said. “I knew going into this race that he was a kid I wanted to beat and hopefully take the win. That’s exactly what happened, so it can’t be any better than that.”

Fox also won the women’s swim last summer.

“It felt really good,” the 2022 Press Girls Swimmer of the Year said. “It was unexpected because I did the paddle race this year, which I didn’t do last year. So I was swimming a little tired. I’m very happy with the outcome of that race.”

Wildwood Crest’s Wyatt McDevitt won the men’s rescue board race

“It feels good,” said McDevitt, who is racing for his second summer. “I have been in the top three but haven’t really got first in too many competitions so far. So it felt good to finally come in first.”

Note: The host Wildwood Beach Patrol dedicated the races to former lifeguard Ryan Comas, who died June 25 at the age of 25. He was serving as a rescue swimmer for the U.S. Coast Guard in Kodiak, Alaska.
